

## Letter from the Vicar

### INDESCRIBABLE

*I make no apologies for this times article being based on Louie Giglio's talk on DVD of the same name, Indescribable. If you've not seen the film it really is worth watching. I've based this article on the first half of his talk only, not wanting to spoil the second half for those who haven't seen it.*

You just have to go outside on a clear evening (I know they are rare in Thornton but there have been some beautiful nights recently) and to look up to the sky to see the glory of the God we serve. When we look up we see the evidence that speaks of HIS glory.

*The heavens declare the glory of God;  
the skies proclaim the work of his hands. (Psalm 19)*

We have an amazing God who spoke words and creation happened, all that we see!

*In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. (Genesis 1)*

And we don't know just how big the universe is, every time we build a bigger and more powerful telescopes we discover more and more. The universe is just vast, beyond our comprehension. When God created the universe the first thing he said was 'let there be light'. Now light travels at 186,000 miles per second. Just so you can get a picture of that, it would take a beam of light just one second to circle the earth seven times - and this light came from God, he spoke and it happened.

*By the word of the LORD were the heavens made,  
their starry host by the breath of his mouth. (Psalm 33)*

In this vast universe we live in the Milky Way sub division, a universe so big we can't measure it in feet, yards, meters or even miles, they're just not adequate to measure such an enormous thing as the universe or even the Milky Way. So we measure distance in 'light years'. A light year is how far light travels (don't forget at 186,000 miles per second) in one year. For those who haven't got big enough calculators that's 5.88 trillion miles per

year. Our sub-division of the universe, the Milky Way, which by the way is only one of billions of sub-divisions called galaxies is 180,000 light years across, if you set off now travelling at 186,000 miles per second, you'll get across to the other side in about 100,000 years. The Milky Way alone has so many stars that if we were able to count them one at a time, one per second it would take us 2,500 years to do it. God knows each and every one intimately, he calls them by name,

*"To whom will you compare me?  
Or who is my equal?" says the Holy One.*

*Lift your eyes and look to the heavens:  
Who created all these?  
He who brings out the starry host one by one,  
and calls them each by name.  
Because of his great power and mighty strength,  
not one of them is missing. (Isaiah 40)*

Within the Milky Way, sort of out between the spiral arms of the galaxy sits a very insignificant, quite standard star that we call the sun and circling this our solar system in which we live on our earth. To get a scale of size here, if our solar system (that is the sun and all the planets, Mercury, Mars, Earth, Venus etc) were the size of a penny, the Milky way would be the size of the North American continent.

Do you feel small? Maybe we're not so important as we thought we were. When Neil Armstrong was returning on one of the Apollo missions he glimpsed an amazing view of our planet through the space craft's window. He says that if he shut one eye he could cover the earth with one of his thumbs. It didn't make him feel like a giant he says, quite the opposite, it made him feel very very small.

*When I consider your heavens,  
the work of your fingers,  
the moon and the stars,  
which you have set in place,  
  
what is man that you are mindful of him,*

*the son of man that you care for him? (Psalm 8)*

Compared to the vastness of the universe we are tiny and insignificant. But it is significant insignificance because although we are so tiny compared to the physical universe we are known and prized by majesty who loves us. This great creator of the heavens and the earth knows us all individually by name, everything about us, our thoughts, feelings, joys, struggles and more than this, much more than this, he has come to us to invite us into a relationship with him that will never never end.

*For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16)*

Following several years of campaigning, a bus service (505) started last December running from Four Lane Ends, through Thornton and Illingworth to Halifax. There is one bus in each direction Monday to Friday (except Bank Holidays). It was introduced for a 6 month trial period on a 'use it or lose it' basis. I have been advised that the service is to continue for the time being - certainly for a few months - but passenger numbers have been quite small.

The service starts at Four Lane Ends at 09.05 and passes through Thornton Village just before 09.15. The return journey leaves Halifax at 13.30. Despite the early start time, Metro has agreed that CONCESSIONARY PASSES CAN BE USED THROUGHOUT on this service. May I ask people to use this service if they can? It allows plenty of time in Halifax for shopping etc. or may be used for onward connections to Huddersfield, Hebden Bridge, Burnley, Brighouse or Dewsbury.

## **Farewell David James, Bishop of Bradford**

Accompanied by a vuvuzela fanfare, the Dean assured us the service would last an hour or so and we would be home in time for the second half of the World Cup Final. Fortunately the England team were not represented, so the services of any David James were not required. (David James is also the name of the England goalie)

Instead we spent a wonderful couple of hours celebrating the service of our David James, Bishop of Bradford for the past eight years, in the company of his wife Gill and their family, the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Bradford, the Lord Lieutenant of West Yorkshire, the family of the Diocese of Bradford, representatives of other faith communities, and the 'great and good' from near and far.

The celebration, in the packed cathedral, was lively, moving and informal. There were film clips with link dioceses in Northern Sudan and South Western Virginia. Film, too, of the Bishop's work at home and abroad, and of course, a clip of him 'baptising' a whole congregation! A sacred dance group performed. Awais Moghal read from Revelation and there were interviews with the newly ordained Gloria Hardisty, Curate at St. James's and St. Saviour's, and our friend and neighbour Chris Howson. These interviews formed part of the presentation about how the diverse community work of the diocese affects people's lives on a daily basis.

Rather than use the £4,000 presented to him as a farewell gift from the people of the diocese to furnish his new home in Beverley, David and Gill have asked that the money goes to the Church in Northern Sudan. There

was also a presentation from the Muslim community. Bishop David thanked people for the gifts, for their friendship, support and prayers. There was a special thank you too from him and many others to his wife Gill for her 'gentle ministry of hospitality and care'.

When asked how he would like to be remembered Bishop David said "At heart I am a parish priest and what I want people to remember is not me but Jesus and the way he can change our lives for the better"

### **Burundi Schools Update - Regarding the Charity called FacilitAid**

I am sure you will all remember a while ago I encouraged folks to knit Burundi teddy bears for the schools project. Now I would like to share with you the recent news that they hoped to have the 7th school project in Karuzi completed by the end of summer as well as finalising plans for the school at Kiri, where 500+ children are currently using a one room church for school! Teaching staff are already allocated here, so as soon as building can take place, the children can relocate and start to reap the rewards of a much more 'learning conducive' environment.

Gren Burgess, FacilitAid's Chairman, writes: "Our passion for making a difference to the children of Burundi is undiminished even though the current economic climate had caused us all to 'tighten our belts.' We really appreciate all you have done and are doing to help!"

FacilitAid have provided schools in Ntobwe, Muzye, Mabuga, Kagongo, N'tanga, Karuzi, and 100% of the donations they receive are sent to their designated project. Their admin costs are covered through specific donations, and make up less than 2% of their operating costs.

It is a community asset and we are anxious to promote its use to local people and groups. So much hard work, planning, form-filling and co-ordinating have gone into this project and we must thank everyone involved for their perseverance - especially James Muff and Eric Heywood.

At the Away Day we had last year, we formulated a 5-year plan, based on the Bishop's 4 principle areas of concern - Going for Growth; Spiritual Heart; Yes to Young people and the Church in the Community. We have made progress in some of these areas - such as forging links with Crossley House and promoting the Lunch Day, but there is still much to do. We are anxious to build up work with young people and are hoping to join with St. James's in doing something in this area.

The Scout Group leaders are keen to involve the children more in worship at Parade Service, so we are looking at ways this can be done - and they would also like to organise a service on a pack night to which members of the congregation would be invited so more children can be involved; it is not always easy to get the children to come on a Sunday morning!

We are planning to run a stewardship campaign after the holidays to look at both financial giving and time and talents. We need help in all areas to ensure we can maintain our Christian presence in Fairweather Green.

Andy will shortly be running courses for those over 13 wishing to be confirmed, and those under 13 wishing to take communion. If you are interested, or know someone who is, please contact him for more information.
